

OLIVE SHARMAN WILSHERE

1888-1945

Born in Leicestershire, Olive, the fourth child in a family of six, spent most of her life in Kirby Muxloe, a village west of Leicester.

At the outbreak of the First World War she became a VAD in Leicester, but later in 1914 went to Kettering Hospital to train as a nurse. On completing her training in 1917, she moved to Ashbourne Cottage Hospital in Derbyshire, but returned to Kirby Muxloe when the war ended.

Olive retained her interest in nursing, becoming a member of the Leicester branch of the Royal College of Nursing, and later a governor of Leicester Royal Infirmary.

In World War Two she was a volunteer at the Kirby First Aid Post, and was on duty there when two landmines were dropped on the village in November 1940.

With a strong interest in the Scout movement, Olive was the Assistant Cub Master of the Kirby Muxloc Cub Pack, and Assistant District Commissioner for Cubs for West Leicester.

From her childhood she was a keen naturalist and later in life she contributed to ornithological publications. Olive was involved in many aspects of the village's life, and was an active member of the Kirby Muxloe Free Church.

She died of cancer in 1945.
